AN ACT

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1995, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
 Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September
 30, 1995, and for other purposes, namely:

13 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

14 SEC. 1. Effective on and after the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of the Senate, subject to the ap-15 16 proval of the Committee on Appropriations of the Senate, is authorized to transfer up to \$300,000 from any Senate 17 appropriations account with respect to which the Secretary 18 has disbursing authority to the revolving fund established 19 20 under section 2(c) under the subheading "ADMINISTRA-TIVE PROVISIONS" under the heading "SENATE" in 21 Public Law 102–392 (2 U.S.C. 121d(c)) to provide addi-22 tional capitalization for such revolving fund. Any moneys 23 so transferred shall be available for use in the same manner 24 and to the same extent as the moneys otherwise in such re-25 volving fund. 26

SEC. 2. (a) Not later than September 30, 1995, the Sec retary of the Senate shall submit to the Committee on Rules
 and Administration a report evaluating the quality and
 scope of the educational experience available to visitors to
 the Senate concerning the constitutional and historical role
 of the Senate in American Government and society.

(b) The Secretary of the Senate shall include in the 7 report a plan for the improvement of the educational experi-8 ence available to Senate visitors. Senate officers and offi-9 cials and legislative branch support agencies shall work 10 with the Secretary of the Senate in the development of the 11 plan. Appropriate executive branch agencies, such as the 12 National Archives and Records Administration and the 13 Smithsonian Institution, are encouraged to offer assistance 14 15 to the Secretary of the Senate in developing the plan.

(c) There are authorized to be paid out of the Contingent Fund of the Senate, upon vouchers approved by the
Secretary of the Senate, such sums as are necessary to reimburse the routine expenses associated with developing the
report required by this section.

SEC. 3. (a) Section 105(a) of the Legislative Branch
Appropriations Act 1965 (Public Law 88–454; 2 U.S.C.
104a) is amended by adding at the end thereof the following
new paragraph:

"(4) Each report by the Secretary of the Senate re-1 quired by paragraph (1) shall contain a separate summary 2 of Senate accounts statement for each office of the Senate 3 authorized to obligate appropriated funds, including each 4 5 Senator's office, each officer of the Senate, and each committee of the Senate. The summary of Senate accounts state-6 7 ment shall include— "(A) the total amount of appropriations made 8 available or allocated to the office: 9 "(B) any supplemental appropriation, transfer 10 of funds. or rescission and the effect of such action on 11 the appropriation or allocation to the office; 12 "(C) total expenses incurred for salary and office 13 14 expenses; and "(D) the unexpended balance.". 15 (b) Section 318 of the Legislative Branch Appropria-16 tions Act, 1991 (Public Law 101-520; 2 U.S.C. 59f) is 17 amended by striking the period at the end of the last sen-18 tence and inserting the following: ", and in the case of each 19 Senator, the allocation made to such Senator from the ap-20 21 propriation for official mail expenses.". (c) The amendments made by this section shall be effec-22 tive with respect to— 23 (1) reports and statements covering periods be-24 ginning on and after October 1, 1994; and 25

(2) appropriations made and obligations in curred on and after such date.

3 SEC. 4. (a) There is established in the Treasury of the United States a revolving fund within the contingent fund 4 of the Senate to be known as the Daniel Webster Senate 5 Page Residence Revolving Fund (hereafter referred to in 6 this section as the "fund"). The fund shall consist of all 7 rental payments and other moneys collected or received by 8 the Sergeant at Arms with regard to the Daniel Webster 9 Senate Page Residence. All moneys in the fund shall be 10 available without fiscal year limitation for disbursement by 11 the Secretary of the Senate in connection with operation 12 and maintenance of the Daniel Webster Senate Page Resi-13 dence not normally performed by the Architect of the Cap-14 itol. In addition, such moneys may be used by the Sergeant 15 at Arms to purchase food and food related items and fund 16 activities for the pages. 17

(b) All moneys received from rental payments and
other moneys collected or received by the Sergeant at Arms
with regard to the Daniel Webster Senate Page Residence
shall be deposited in the fund and shall be available for
purposes of this section.

(c) Disbursements from the fund shall be made upon
vouchers approved by the Sergeant at Arms, or the designee
of the Sergeant at Arms.

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(d) The Sergeant at Arms is authorized to prescribe
 such regulations as may be necessary to carry out the provi sions of this section and to provide for the operations of
 the Daniel Webster Senate Page Residence.

SEC. 5. Effective October 1, 1994, each of the figures 5 contained in section 506(b)(3)(A)(iii) of the Supplemental 6 Appropriations Act, 1973 (2 U.S.C. 58(b)(3)(A)(iii)) is in-7 creased by \$50,000: Provided, That, in any fiscal year be-8 ginning with fiscal year 1995, a Senator may use funds 9 provided for official office expenses, but not to exceed 10 \$50,000, for mass mailing, as defined in section 6(b)(1) and 11 all such mass mailings shall be under the frank. 12

SEC. 6. (a) This section shall apply to mailings by
Senators, made during fiscal year 1995 and each fiscal year
thereafter in addition to any other law relating to the use
of the franking privilege.

17 *(b)* For the purposes of this paragraph—

18 (1) the term "mass mailing"—

(A) means, with respect to a session of Congress, a mailing of more than 500 newsletters or
other pieces of mail with substantially identical
content (whether such mail is deposited singly or
in bulk, or at the same time or different times),
but

25 (B) does not include a mailing—

(i) of matter in direct response to a 1 2 communication from a person to whom the *matter is mailed:* 3 4 *(ii) to other Members of Congress or to* a Federal, State, or local government offi-5 6 cial: (iii) of a news release to the commu-7 nications media: 8 (iv) of a town meeting notice, but no 9 such mailing may be made fewer than 60 10 days immediately before the date of any 11 primary election or general election (wheth-12 er regular, special, or runoff) for any Fed-13 14 eral. State. or local office in which a Member of the Senate is a candidate for election: 15 16 0ľ 17 (v) of a Federal publication or other 18 item that is provided by the Senate to all 19 Senators or made available by the Senate for purchase by all Senators from official 20 funds specifically for distribution. 21 (c) Except as provided in section 5, a Senator may 22 not mail a mass mailing under the frank. 23 (d) The Senate Committee on Rules and Administra-24 tion shall prescribe rules and regulations and take other

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action as the Committee considers necessary and proper for
 Senators to comply with this section and regulations.

SEC. 7. Of the funds previously appropriated under the heading "SENATE", \$65,000,000 shall not remain available for obligation beyond the date of enactment of this Act.

SEC. 8. None of the funds appropriated under the heading "SENATE" under the subheading "OFFICIAL MAIL COSTS" may be used in any fiscal year beginning on or after October 1, 1994, for mass mailings as defined in sec- tion 6(b)(1).

11 SEC. 302. No part of any appropriation contained in 12 this Act shall remain available for obligation beyond the 13 current fiscal year unless expressly so provided herein.

14 SEC. 303. Whenever any office or position not specifically established by the Legislative Pay Act of 1929 is ap-15 propriated for herein or whenever the rate of compensa-16 tion or designation of any position appropriated for herein 17 is different from that specifically established for such posi-18 tion by such Act, the rate of compensation and the des-19 ignation of the position, or either, appropriated for or pro-20 21 vided herein, shall be the permanent law with respect 22 thereto: *Provided*, That the provisions herein for the various items of official expenses of Members, officers, and 23 24 committees of the Senate and House of Representatives, and clerk hire for Senators and Members of the House 25

of Representatives shall be the permanent law with respect
 thereto.

3 SEC. 304. The expenditure of any appropriation 4 under this Act for any consulting service through procure-5 ment contract, pursuant to 5 U.S.C. 3109, shall be limited 6 to those contracts where such expenditures are a matter 7 of public record and available for public inspection, except 8 where otherwise provided under existing law, or under ex-9 isting Executive order issued pursuant to existing law.

SEC. 305. The last sentence of section 307(a) of the
