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## AN ACT

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1995, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*  
3       That the following sums are appropriated, out of any  
4       money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the  
5       Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September  
6       30, 1995, and for other purposes, namely:

11            *Of the funds previously appropriated under the head-*  
12 *ing "SENATE", \$23,000,000 are rescinded.*

13                    *ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS*

14            *SEC. 1. Effective on and after the date of enactment*  
15 *of this Act, the Secretary of the Senate, subject to the ap-*  
16 *proval of the Committee on Appropriations of the Senate,*  
17 *is authorized to transfer up to \$300,000 from any Senate*  
18 *appropriations account with respect to which the Secretary*  
19 *has disbursing authority to the revolving fund established*  
20 *under section 2(c) under the subheading "ADMINISTRA-*  
21 *TIVE PROVISIONS" under the heading "SENATE" in*  
22 *Public Law 102-392 (2 U.S.C. 121d(c)) to provide addi-*  
23 *tional capitalization for such revolving fund. Any moneys*  
24 *so transferred shall be available for use in the same manner*  
25 *and to the same extent as the moneys otherwise in such re-*  
26 *volving fund.*

1        *SEC. 2. (a) Not later than September 30, 1995, the Sec-*  
2 *retary of the Senate shall submit to the Committee on Rules*  
3 *and Administration a report evaluating the quality and*  
4 *scope of the educational experience available to visitors to*  
5 *the Senate concerning the constitutional and historical role*  
6 *of the Senate in American Government and society.*

7        *(b) The Secretary of the Senate shall include in the*  
8 *report a plan for the improvement of the educational experi-*  
9 *ence available to Senate visitors. Senate officers and offi-*  
10 *cials and legislative branch support agencies shall work*  
11 *with the Secretary of the Senate in the development of the*  
12 *plan. Appropriate executive branch agencies, such as the*  
13 *National Archives and Records Administration and the*  
14 *Smithsonian Institution, are encouraged to offer assistance*  
15 *to the Secretary of the Senate in developing the plan.*

16        *(c) There are authorized to be paid out of the Contin-*  
17 *gent Fund of the Senate, upon vouchers approved by the*  
18 *Secretary of the Senate, such sums as are necessary to reim-*  
19 *burse the routine expenses associated with developing the*  
20 *report required by this section.*

21        *SEC. 3. (a) Section 105(a) of the Legislative Branch*  
22 *Appropriations Act 1965 (Public Law 88-454; 2 U.S.C.*  
23 *104a) is amended by adding at the end thereof the following*  
24 *new paragraph:*

1       “(4) Each report by the Secretary of the Senate re-  
2       quired by paragraph (1) shall contain a separate summary  
3       of Senate accounts statement for each office of the Senate  
4       authorized to obligate appropriated funds, including each  
5       Senator’s office, each officer of the Senate, and each commit-  
6       tee of the Senate. The summary of Senate accounts state-  
7       ment shall include—

8               “(A) the total amount of appropriations made  
9               available or allocated to the office;

10              “(B) any supplemental appropriation, transfer  
11              of funds, or rescission and the effect of such action on  
12              the appropriation or allocation to the office;

13              “(C) total expenses incurred for salary and office  
14              expenses; and

15              “(D) the unexpended balance.”.

16       (b) Section 318 of the Legislative Branch Appropria-  
17       tions Act, 1991 (Public Law 101–520; 2 U.S.C. 59f) is  
18       amended by striking the period at the end of the last sen-  
19       tence and inserting the following: “, and in the case of each  
20       Senator, the allocation made to such Senator from the ap-  
21       propriation for official mail expenses.”.

22       (c) The amendments made by this section shall be effec-  
23       tive with respect to—

24              (1) reports and statements covering periods be-  
25              ginning on and after October 1, 1994; and



1           (2) appropriations made and obligations in-  
2           curred on and after such date.

3           SEC. 4. (a) There is established in the Treasury of the  
4           United States a revolving fund within the contingent fund  
5           of the Senate to be known as the Daniel Webster Senate  
6           Page Residence Revolving Fund (hereafter referred to in  
7           this section as the "fund"). The fund shall consist of all  
8           rental payments and other moneys collected or received by  
9           the Sergeant at Arms with regard to the Daniel Webster  
10          Senate Page Residence. All moneys in the fund shall be  
11          available without fiscal year limitation for disbursement by  
12          the Secretary of the Senate in connection with operation  
13          and maintenance of the Daniel Webster Senate Page Resi-  
14          dence not normally performed by the Architect of the Cap-  
15          itol. In addition, such moneys may be used by the Sergeant  
16          at Arms to purchase food and food related items and fund  
17          activities for the pages.

18          (b) All moneys received from rental payments and  
19          other moneys collected or received by the Sergeant at Arms  
20          with regard to the Daniel Webster Senate Page Residence  
21          shall be deposited in the fund and shall be available for  
22          purposes of this section.

23          (c) Disbursements from the fund shall be made upon  
24          vouchers approved by the Sergeant at Arms, or the designee  
25          of the Sergeant at Arms.

1           (d) *The Sergeant at Arms is authorized to prescribe*  
2 *such regulations as may be necessary to carry out the provi-*  
3 *sions of this section and to provide for the operations of*  
4 *the Daniel Webster Senate Page Residence.*

5           *SEC. 5. Effective October 1, 1994, each of the figures*  
6 *contained in section 506(b)(3)(A)(iii) of the Supplemental*  
7 *Appropriations Act, 1973 (2 U.S.C. 58(b)(3)(A)(iii)) is in-*  
8 *creased by \$50,000: Provided, That, in any fiscal year be-*  
9 *ginning with fiscal year 1995, a Senator may use funds*  
10 *provided for official office expenses, but not to exceed*  
11 *\$50,000, for mass mailing, as defined in section 6(b)(1) and*  
12 *all such mass mailings shall be under the frank.*

13           *SEC. 6. (a) This section shall apply to mailings by*  
14 *Senators, made during fiscal year 1995 and each fiscal year*  
15 *thereafter in addition to any other law relating to the use*  
16 *of the franking privilege.*

17           (b) *For the purposes of this paragraph—*

18                   (1) *the term “mass mailing”—*

19                           (A) *means, with respect to a session of Con-*  
20 *gress, a mailing of more than 500 newsletters or*  
21 *other pieces of mail with substantially identical*  
22 *content (whether such mail is deposited singly or*  
23 *in bulk, or at the same time or different times),*  
24 *but*

25                           (B) *does not include a mailing—*

1           (i) of matter in direct response to a  
2           communication from a person to whom the  
3           matter is mailed;

4           (ii) to other Members of Congress or to  
5           a Federal, State, or local government offi-  
6           cial;

7           (iii) of a news release to the commu-  
8           nications media;

9           (iv) of a town meeting notice, but no  
10          such mailing may be made fewer than 60  
11          days immediately before the date of any  
12          primary election or general election (wheth-  
13          er regular, special, or runoff) for any Fed-  
14          eral, State, or local office in which a Mem-  
15          ber of the Senate is a candidate for election;  
16          or

17          (v) of a Federal publication or other  
18          item that is provided by the Senate to all  
19          Senators or made available by the Senate  
20          for purchase by all Senators from official  
21          funds specifically for distribution.

22          (c) Except as provided in section 5, a Senator may  
23          not mail a mass mailing under the frank.

24          (d) The Senate Committee on Rules and Administra-  
25          tion shall prescribe rules and regulations and take other

1 *action as the Committee considers necessary and proper for*  
2 *Senators to comply with this section and regulations.*

3 *SEC. 7. Of the funds previously appropriated under*  
4 *the heading "SENATE", \$65,000,000 shall not remain*  
5 *available for obligation beyond the date of enactment of this*  
6 *Act.*

7 *SEC. 8. None of the funds appropriated under the*  
8 *heading "SENATE" under the subheading "OFFICIAL MAIL*  
9 *COSTS" may be used in any fiscal year beginning on or*  
10 *after October 1, 1994, for mass mailings as defined in sec-*  
11 *tion 6(b)(1).*

18 For salaries, expenses, and studies by the Committee  
19 on the Budget, and temporary personal services for such  
20 committee to be expended in accordance with sections  
21 101(c), 606, 703, and 901(e) of the Congressional Budget  
22 Act of 1974, and to be available for reimbursement to  
23 agencies for services performed, \$401,000.

24 STANDING COMMITTEES, SPECIAL AND SELECT

25 For salaries and expenses of standing committees,  
26 special and select, authorized by the House, \$53,191,000.

1 COMMITTEE ON HOUSE ADMINISTRATION  
2 HOUSE INFORMATION SYSTEMS

3 For salaries, expenses and temporary personal serv-  
4 ices of House Information Systems, under the direction  
5 of the Committee on House Administration, \$22,437,000,  
6 of which \$16,017,000 is provided herein: *Provided*, That  
7 House Information Systems is authorized to receive reim-  
8 bursement for services provided from Members of the  
9 House of Representatives and other Governmental entities  
10 and such reimbursement shall be deposited in the Treas-  
11 ury for credit to this account: *Provided further*, That  
12 amounts so credited for fiscal year 1994 and not obligated  
13 shall be available for obligation in fiscal year 1995.

14 ALLOWANCES AND EXPENSES

15 For allowances and expenses as authorized by House  
16 resolution or law, \$244,572,000, including: Official Ex-  
17 penses of Members, \$79,800,000; supplies, materials, ad-  
18 ministrative costs and Federal tort claims, \$6,103,000;  
19 net expenses of purchase, lease and maintenance of office  
20 equipment, \$11,779,000; net expenses for telecommuni-  
21 cations, \$10,872,000; furniture and furnishings,  
22 \$2,012,000; stenographic reporting of committee hearings,  
23 \$1,100,000; reemployed annuitants reimbursements,  
24 \$1,279,000; Government contributions to employees' life  
25 insurance fund, retirement funds, Social Security fund,

1 Medicare fund, health benefits fund, and worker's and un-  
2 employment compensation, \$130,849,000; and miscellane-  
3 ous items including purchase, exchange, maintenance, re-  
4 pair and operation of House motor vehicles,  
5 interparliamentary receptions, and gratuities to heirs of  
6 deceased employees of the House, \$778,000.

7 CHILD CARE CENTER

8 For salaries and expenses of the House of Represent-  
9 atives Child Care Center, such amounts as are deposited  
10 in the account established by section 312(d)(1) of the Leg-  
11 islative Branch Appropriations Act, 1992 (40 U.S.C.  
12 184g(d)(1)), subject to the level specified in the budget  
13 of the Center, as submitted to the Committee on Appro-  
14 priations of the House of Representatives.

15 COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS (STUDIES AND  
16 INVESTIGATIONS)

17 For salaries and expenses, studies and examinations  
18 of executive agencies, by the Committee on Appropria-  
19 tions, and temporary personal services for such committee,  
20 to be expended in accordance with section 202(b) of the  
21 Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946 and to be available  
22 for reimbursement to agencies for services performed,  
23 \$6,495,000: *Provided*, That the Federal Bureau of Inves-  
24 tigation, notwithstanding any other provision of law, may  
25 in any fiscal year pay all administrative uncontrollable

1 overtime accrued by its employees while on detail to the  
2 Committee on Appropriations.

3 OFFICIAL MAIL COSTS

4 For expenses necessary for official mail costs of the  
5 House of Representatives, as authorized by law,  
6 \$31,000,000.

7 SALARIES, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

8 For compensation and expenses of officers and em-  
9 ployees, as authorized by law, \$56,354,000, including: for  
10 salaries and expenses of the Office of the Clerk, including  
11 not to exceed \$1,000 for official representation and recep-  
12 tion expenses, \$14,158,000; for salaries and expenses of  
13 the Office of the Sergeant at Arms, including not to exceed  
14 \$500 for official representation and reception expenses,  
15 \$1,502,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the  
16 Doorkeeper, including overtime as authorized by law,  
17 \$11,506,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of Di-  
18 rector of Non-legislative and Financial Services,  
19 \$16,360,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of In-  
20 spector General, \$295,000; for salaries and expenses of  
21 the Office of General Counsel, \$762,000; Office of the  
22 Chaplain, \$124,000; Office of the Parliamentarian, includ-  
23 ing the Parliamentarian and \$2,000 for preparing the Di-  
24 gest of Rules, \$983,000; for salaries and expenses of the  
25 Office of the Historian, \$337,000; for salaries and ex-  
26 penses of the Office of the Law Revision Counsel of the



1 House, \$1,630,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office  
2 of the Legislative Counsel of the House, \$4,400,000; six  
3 minority employees, \$747,000; the House Democratic  
4 Steering and Policy Committee and the Democratic Cau-  
5 cus, \$1,523,000; the House Republican Conference,  
6 \$1,523,000; and other authorized employees, \$504,000.

7 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

8 SEC. 101. (a) TRANSFER OF MAJORITY AND MINOR-  
9 ITY PRINTERS TO DIRECTOR OF NON-LEGISLATIVE AND  
10 FINANCIAL SERVICES.—As soon as practicable, but not  
11 later than October 1, 1994, authority over the Majority  
12 and Minority Printers of the House of Representatives  
13 shall be transferred to the Director of Non-legislative and  
14 Financial Services of the House.

15 (b) FEES FOR OFFICES AND UTILITIES.—

16 (1) IN GENERAL.—Upon the transfer required  
17 by subsection (a), the Director shall charge the Ma-  
18 jority and Minority Printers a reasonable monthly  
19 fee for the rental of offices and utilities.

20 (2) AVAILABILITY OF RECEIPTS.—The amounts  
21 received under this subsection shall be deposited in  
22 the Treasury of the United States for credit to the  
23 appropriation for “Salaries and Expenses of the  
24 House of Representatives”, and shall be available for

1 expenditure in any fiscal year to the extent provided  
2 in appropriations Acts.

3 (c) APPLICABILITY.—This section shall take effect  
4 upon the date of the enactment of this Act and shall apply  
5 to any fiscal year.

### 8 JOINT ECONOMIC COMMITTEE

9 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Economic  
10 Committee, \$4,090,000, to be disbursed by the Secretary  
11 of the Senate.

### 12 JOINT COMMITTEE ON PRINTING

13 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Committee on  
14 Printing, \$1,370,000, to be disbursed by the Secretary of  
15 the Senate.

### 16 JOINT COMMITTEE ON TAXATION

17 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Committee on  
18 Taxation, \$6,019,000, to be disbursed by the Clerk of the  
19 House.

20 For other joint items, as follows:

### 21 OFFICE OF THE ATTENDING PHYSICIAN

22 For medical supplies, equipment, and contingent ex-  
23 penses of the emergency rooms, and for the Attending  
24 Physician and his assistants, including (1) an allowance  
25 of \$1,500 per month to the Attending Physician; (2) an  
26 allowance of \$500 per month each to two medical officers

1 while on duty in the Attending Physician's office; (3) an  
2 allowance of \$500 per month each to two assistants and  
3 \$400 per month each not to exceed nine assistants on the  
4 basis heretofore provided for such assistance; and (4)  
5 \$918,000 for reimbursement to the Department of the  
6 Navy for expenses incurred for staff and equipment as-  
7 signed to the Office of the Attending Physician, which

14     *signed on the basis of merit and fitness after fair*  
15     *and equitable consideration of all applicants and*

9           *(E) A formal performance appraisal system*  
10          *which will permit the accurate evaluation of job*  
11          *performance on the basis of objective criteria for*  
12          *all Architect of the Capitol employees.*

13          *(F) A fair and equitable system to address*  
14          *unacceptable conduct and performance by Archi-*  
15          *tect of the Capitol employees, including a general*  
16          *statement of violations, sanctions, and proce-*  
17          *dures which shall be made known to all employ-*  
18          *ees, and a formal grievance procedure.*

19          *(G) A program to provide services to deal*  
20          *with mental health, alcohol abuse, drug abuse,*  
21          *and other employee problems, and which ensures*  
22          *employee confidentiality.*

23          *(H) A formal policy statement regarding*  
24          *the use and accrual of sick and annual leave*  
25          *which shall be made known to all employees, and*

1           *which is consistent with the other requirements*  
2           *of this section.*

3           (d) *IMPLEMENTATION OF PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT*  
4 *SYSTEM.—*

5           (1) *DEVELOPMENT OF PLAN.—The Architect of*  
6 *the Capitol shall—*

7                   (A) *develop a plan for the establishment*  
8 *and maintenance of a personnel management*  
9 *system designed to achieve the requirements of*  
10 *subsection (c);*

11                   (B) *submit the plan to the Speaker of the*  
12 *House of Representatives, the House Office*  
13 *Building Commission, the Committee on Rules*  
14 *and Administration of the Senate, and the Joint*  
15 *Committee on the Library not later than 12*  
16 *months after the date of enactment of this Act;*  
17 *and*

18                   (C) *implement the plan not later than 90*  
19 *days after the plan is submitted to the Speaker*  
20 *of the House of Representatives, the House Office*  
21 *Building Commission, the Committee on Rules*  
22 *and Administration of the Senate, and the Joint*  
23 *Committee on the Library, as specified in para-*  
24 *graph (2).*

1           (2) *EVALUATION AND REPORTING.*—*The Archi-*  
2 *tect of the Capitol shall develop a system of oversight*  
3 *and evaluation to ensure that the personnel manage-*  
4 *ment system of the Architect of the Capitol achieves*  
5 *the requirements of subsection (c) and complies with*  
6 *all other relevant laws, rules and regulations. The Ar-*  
7 *chitect of the Capitol shall report to the Speaker of the*  
8 *House of Representatives, the House Office Building*  
9 *Commission, the Committee on Rules and Adminis-*

3           *Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 791) and sections*  
4           *102 through 104 of the Americans with Dis-*  
5           *abilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12112–14).*

6           (B) *INTIMIDATION PROHIBITED.—Any in-*  
7           *timidation of, or reprisal against, any employee*  
8           *by the Architect of the Capitol, or by any em-*  
9           *ployee of the Architect of the Capitol, because of*  
10          *the exercise of a right under this section con-*  
11          *stitutes an unlawful employment practice, which*  
12          *may be remedied in the same manner as are*
