for purposes of this section.

(d) Disbursements from the fund shall be made on
 vouchers approved by the Chaplain of the Senate.

17 SEC. 314. (a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds that—

- 18 (1) war and human tragedy have reigned in the19 Balkans since January 1991;
- 20 (2) the conflict has occasioned the most horren21 dous war crimes since Nazi Germany and the Third
  22 Reich's death camps;
- 23 (3) these war crimes have been characterized by
  24 "ethnic cleansing", summary executions, torture, forc25 ible displacement, massive and systematic rape, and

1	attacks on medical and relief personnel committed
2	mostly by Bosnian Serb military, para-military, and
3	police forces;
4	(4) more than 200,000 people, mostly Bosnian
5	Muslims, have been killed or are missing, 2.2 million
6	are refugees, and another 1.8 million have been dis-
7	placed in Bosnia;
8	(5) the final report of the Commission of Experts
9	on War Crimes in the Former Yugoslavia, submitted
10	to the United Nations Security Council on May 31,
11	1995, documents more than 3500 pages of detailed
12	evidence of war crimes committed in Bosnia;
13	(6) the decisions of the United Nations Security
14	Council have been disregarded with impunity;
15	(7) Bosnian Serb forces have hindered humani-
16	tarian and relief efforts by the United Nations High
17	Commissioner for Refugees, the International Com-
18	mittee of the Red Cross, and other relief efforts;
19	(8) Bosnian Serb forces have incessantly shelled
20	relief outposts, hospitals, and Bosnian population
21	centers;
22	(9) the rampage of violence and suffering in
23	Bosnia and Herzegovina continues unchecked and the
24	United Nations and NATO remain unable or willing
25	to stop it; and

1	(10) the feeble reaction to the Bosnian tragedy is
2	sending a message to the world that barbaric warfare
3	and inhumanity is to be rewarded.
4	(b) Sense of the Senate.—It is the sense of the Sen-
5	ate that the Senate hereby—
6	(1) condemns the war crimes and crimes against
7	humanity committed by all sides to the conflict in the
8	Balkans, particularly the Bosnian Serbs; and
9	(2) condemns the policies and actions of Bosnian
10	Serb President Radovan Karadzic and Bosnian Serb
11	military commander Ratko Mladic and urges the
12	Special Prosecutor of the International Criminal Tri-
13	bunal for the Former Yugoslavia to expedite the re-
14	view of evidence for their indictment for such crimes.
15	(3) It is the sense of the Senate that the Special
16	Prosecutor for the International Criminal Tribunal
17	for the Former Yugoslavia should investigate the re-
18	cent and ongoing violations of international humani-
19	tarian law in Bosnia and Herzegovina.
20	(4) The Senate urges the President to make all
21	information, including intelligence information, on
22	war crimes and war criminals available to the Inter-
23	national Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugo-
24	slavia.

1	(5) It is the sense of the Senate that the Presi-
2	dent should not terminate economic sanctions, or co-
3	operate in the termination of such sanctions, against
4	the Governments of Serbia and Montenegro unless
5	and until the President determines and certifies to
6	Congress that President Slobodan Milosovic of Serbia
7	is cooperating fully with the International Criminal
8	Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia.
