A BILL

To increase the safety of swimming pools and spas by requiring the use of proper anti-entrapment drain covers and pool and spa drainage systems, by establishing a swimming pool safety grant program administered by the Consumer Product Safety Commission to encourage States to improve their pool and spa safety laws and to educate the public about pool and spa safety, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; TABLE OF CONTENTS.
- 4 (a) Short Title.—This Act may be cited as the "Vir-
- 5 ginia Graeme Baker Pool and Spa Safety Act".
- 6 (b) Table of Contents for

- 8 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 9 The Congress finds that—

- 1 (1) of injury-related deaths, drowning is the sec-2 ond leading cause of death in children aged 1 to 14 3 in the United States;
 - (2) there are approximately 260 drowning deaths of children younger than age 5 each year in swimming pools, and an estimated 2,725 children are treated annually in hospital emergency rooms for pool submersion injuries, mostly in residential pools;
 - (3) many children die due to pool and spa drowning and entrapment, such as Virginia Graeme Baker, who at age 7 drowned by entrapment in a residential spa, and Preston de Ibern, who at age 5 nearly drowned and was left permanently brain damaged, finally succumbing to his catastrophic healthcare issues when he was 12 years old;
 - (4) adult supervision at all aquatic venues is a critical safety factor in preventing children from drowning; and
 - (5) research studies show that the installation and proper use of barriers or fencing, as well as additional layers of protection, could substantially reduce the number of childhood residential swimming pool drownings and near drownings.

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1 SEC. 3. FEDERAL SWIMMING POOL AND SPA DRAIN COVER

- 2 STANDARD.
- 3 (a) Consumer Product Safety Rule.—The provi-
- 4 sions of subsection (b) shall be considered to be a consumer
- 5 product safety rule issued by the Consumer Product Safety
- 6 Commission under section 9 of the Consumer Product Safe-
- 7 ty Act (15 U.S.C. 2058).
- 8 (b) Drain Cover Standard.—Effective 1 year after
- 9 the date of enactment of this Act, each swimming pool or
- 10 spa drain cover manufactured, distributed, or entered into
- 11 commerce in the United States shall conform to the entrap-
- 12 ment protection standards of the ASME/ANSI A112.19.8
- 13 performance standard.
- 14 (c) REVISION OF RULE.—If, after the enactment of this
- 15 Act, ANSI proposes to revise the entrapment protection re-
- 16 quirements of ASME/ANSI A112.19.8, ANSI shall notify
- 17 the Consumer Product Safety Commission of the proposed
- 18 revision and the proposed revision shall be incorporated in
- 19 the consumer product safety rule under subsection (a) un-
- 20 less, within 60 days of such notice, the Commission notifies
- 21 ANSI that the Commission has determined that such revi-
- 22 sion does not carry out the purposes of subsection (b).
- 23 (d) Implementing Regulations.—Section 553 of
- 24 title 5, United States Code, shall apply with respect to the
- 25 issuance of any regulations by the Consumer Product Safety
- 26 Commission to implement the requirements of this section,

1	and sections 7 and 9 of the Consumer Product Safety Act
2	shall not apply to such issuance.
3	SEC. 4. STATE SWIMMING POOL SAFETY GRANT PROGRAM.
4	(a) In General.—Subject to the availability of appro-
5	priations authorized by subsection (e), the Commission shall
6	establish a grant program to provide assistance to eligible
7	States.
8	(b) Eligibility.—To be eligible for a grant under the
9	program, a State shall—
10	(1) demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Com-
11	mission that it has a State statute, or that, after the
12	date of enactment of this Act, it has enacted a statute,
13	or amended an existing statute, that provides for the
14	enforcement of a law that—
15	(A) except as provided in section
16	5(a)(1)(A)(i), applies to all swimming pools in
17	the State; and
18	(B) meets the minimum State law require-
19	ments of section 5; and
20	(2) submit an application to the Commission at
21	such time, in such form, and containing such addi-
22	tional information as the Commission may require.
23	(c) Amount of Grant.—The Commission shall deter-
24	mine the amount of a grant awarded under this Act, and
25	shall consider—

1	(1) the population and relative enforcement
2	needs of each qualifying State; and
3	(2) allocation of grant funds in a manner de-
4	signed to provide the maximum benefit from the pro-
5	gram in terms of protecting children from drowning
6	or entrapment, and, in making that allocation, shall
7	give priority to States that have not received a grant
8	under this Act in a preceding fiscal year.
9	(d) Use of Grant Funds.—A State receiving a grant
10	under this section shall use—
11	(1) at least 50 percent of amount made available
12	to hire and train enforcement personnel for imple-
13	mentation and enforcement of standards under the
14	State swimming pool and spa safety law; and
15	(2) the remainder—
16	(A) to educate pool construction and instal-
17	lation companies and pool service companies
18	about the standards;
19	(B) to educate pool owners, pool operators,
20	and other members of the public about the stand-
21	ards under the swimming pool and spa safety
22	law and about the prevention of drowning or en-
23	trapment of children using swimming pools and
24	spas; and

1	(C) to defray administrative costs associ-
2	ated with such training and education programs.
3	(e) Authorization of Appropriations.—There are
4	authorized to be appropriated to the Commission for each
5	of fiscal years 2009 through 2013 \$5,000,000 to carry out
6	this section, such sums to remain available until expended.
7	SEC. 5. MINIMUM STATE LAW REQUIREMENTS.
8	(a) In General.—
9	(1) Safety standards.—A State meets the
10	minimum State law requirements of this section if—
11	(A) the State requires by statute—
12	(i) the enclosure of all outdoor residen-
13	tial pools and spas by barriers to entry that
14	will effectively prevent small children from
15	gaining unsupervised and unfettered access
16	to the pool or spa;
17	(ii) that all pools and spas be equipped
18	with devices and systems designed to pre-
19	vent entrapment by pool or spa drains;
20	(iii) that pools and spas built more
21	than 1 year after the date of enactment of
22	such statute have—
23	(I) more than 1 drain per circula-
24	tion pump;

1	(II) 1 or more unblockable drains
2	per circulation pump; or
3	(III) no main drain; and
4	(iv) every swimming pool and spa that
5	has a main drain, other than an
6	unblockable drain, be equipped with a drain
7	cover that meets the consumer product safe-
8	ty standard established by section 3; and
9	(B) the State meets such additional State
10	law requirements for pools and spas as the Com-
11	mission may establish after public notice and a
12	30-day public comment period.
13	(2) Use of minimum state law require-
14	MENTS.—The Commission—
15	(A) shall use the minimum State law re-
16	quirements under paragraph (1) solely for the
17	purpose of determining the eligibility of a State
18	for a grant under section 4 of this Act; and
19	(B) may not enforce any requirement under
20	paragraph (1) except for the purpose of deter-
21	mining the eligibility of a State for a grant
22	under section 4 of this Act.
23	(3) Requirements to reflect national per-
24	FORMANCE STANDARDS AND COMMISSION GUIDE-

1	LINES.—In establishing minimum State law require-
2	ments under paragraph (1), the Commission shall—
3	(A) consider current or revised national
4	performance standards on pool and spa barrier
5	protection and entrapment prevention; and
6	(B) ensure that any such requirements are
7	consistent with the guidelines contained in the
8	Commission's publication 362, entitled "Safety
9	Barrier Guidelines for Home Pools", the Com-
10	mission's publication entitled "Guidelines for
11	Entrapment Hazards: Making Pools and Spas
12	Safer", and any other pool safety guidelines es-
13	tablished by the Commission.
14	(b) STANDARDS.—Nothing in this section prevents the
15	Commission from promulgating standards regulating pool
16	and spa safety or from relying on an applicable national
17	performance standard.
18	(c) Basic Access-Related Safety Devices and
19	Equipment Requirements to Be Considered.—In es-
20	tablishing minimum State law requirements for swimming
21	pools and spas under subsection (a)(1), the Commission
22	shall consider the following requirements:
23	(1) Covers.—A safety pool cover.

1	(2) Gates.—A gate with direct access to the
2	swimming pool that is equipped with a self-closing,
3	self-latching device.
4	(3) Doors.—Any door with direct access to the
5	swimming pool that is equipped with an audible alert
6	device or alarm which sounds when the door is
7	opened.
8	(4) Pool Alarm.—A device designed to provide
9	rapid detection of an entry into the water of a swim-
10	ming pool or spa.
11	(d) Entrapment, Entanglement, and Eviscera-
12	TION PREVENTION STANDARDS TO BE REQUIRED.—
13	(1) In General.—In establishing additional
14	minimum State law requirements for swimming pools
15	and spas under subsection (a)(1), the Commission
16	shall require, at a minimum, 1 or more of the fol-
17	lowing (except for pools constructed without a single
18	main drain):
19	(A) Safety vacuum release system.—A
20	safety vacuum release system which ceases oper-
21	ation of the pump, reverses the circulation flow,
22	or otherwise provides a vacuum release at a suc-
23	tion outlet when a blockage is detected, that has

been tested by an independent third party and

1	found to conform to ASME/ANSI standard
2	A112.19.17 or ASTM standard F2387.
3	(B) Suction-limiting vent system.—A
4	suction-limiting vent system with a tamper-re-
5	sistant atmospheric opening.
6	(C) Gravity drainage system.—A grav-
7	ity drainage system that utilizes a collector tank.
8	(D) Automatic pump shut-off system.—
9	An automatic pump shut-off system.
10	(E) Other systems.—Any other system
11	determined by the Commission to be equally ef-
12	fective as, or better than, the systems described in
13	subparagraphs (A) through (E) of this para-
14	graph at preventing or eliminating the risk of
15	injury or death associated with pool drainage
16	systems.
17	(2) APPLICABLE STANDARDS.—Any device or
18	system described in subparagraphs (B) through (E) of
19	paragraph (1) shall meet the requirements of any
20	ASME/ANSI or ASTM performance standard if there
21	is such a standard for such a device or system, or any
22	applicable consumer product safety standard.
23	SEC. 6. EDUCATION PROGRAM.
24	(a) In General.—The Commission shall establish and
25	carry out an education program to inform the public of

1	methods to prevent drowning and entrapment in swimming
2	pools, spas, and ornamental pools. In carrying out the pro-
3	gram, the Commission shall develop—
4	(1) educational materials designed for pool man-
5	ufacturers, pool service companies, and pool supply
6	retail outlets;
7	(2) educational materials designed for pool own-
8	ers and operators;
9	(3) educational materials designed for orna-
10	mental pool owners and operators, including munici-
11	palities; and
12	(4) a national media campaign to promote
13	awareness of pool and spa safety.
14	(b) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There are
15	authorized to be appropriated to the Commission for each
16	of fiscal years 2008 through 2012 \$5,000,000 to carry out
17	the education program authorized by subsection (a).
18	SEC. 7. DEFINITIONS.
19	In this Act:
20	(1) ASME/ANSI STANDARD.—The term "ASME/
21	ANSI standard" means a safety standard accredited
22	by the American National Standards Institute and
23	published by the American Society of Mechanical En-
24	gineers.

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- (2) ASTM STANDARD.—The term "ASTM standard" means a safety standard issued by ASTM International, formerly known as the American Society for Testing and Materials.
 - (3) Barrier.—The term "barrier", with respect to a swimming pool, means a fence, dwelling wall, or nondwelling wall, or any combination thereof, which completely surrounds the swimming pool and obstructs access to the swimming pool, especially access from the residence or from the yard outside the barrier. In the case where a wall of a dwelling that contains a door or window serves as part of the barrier, all doors and windows providing direct access from the home to the pool must be equipped with an exit alarm that has a minimum sound pressure rating of 85 dB A at 10 feet. Alarms should meet the requirements of UL 2017 General-Purpose Signaling Devices and Systems, section 77. All doors providing direct access from the home to the pool must be equipped with a self-closing, self-latching device with a release mechanism placed no lower than 54 inches above the floor. The term "barrier" means, with respect to a portable hot tub, a lockable cover.
 - (4) COMMISSION.—The term "Commission" means the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

- 1 (5) MAIN DRAIN.—The term "main drain"
 2 means a submerged suction outlet typically located at
 3 the bottom of a pool or spa to conduct water to a re4 circulating pump.
 - (6) Ornamental Pool.—The term "ornamental pool" means a man-made structure designed to contain water such as a decorative fountain or reflecting pool in the ground, partially in the ground, or in a building, intended primarily for aesthetic value and not intended for swimming or wading.
 - (7) SAFETY VACUUM RELEASE SYSTEM.—The term "safety vacuum release system" means a vacuum release system capable of providing vacuum release at a suction outlet caused by a high vacuum occurrence due to a suction outlet flow blockage.
 - (8) Unblockable Drain.—The term "unblockable drain" means a drain of any size and shape that a human body cannot sufficiently block to create a suction entrapment hazard.
 - (9) SWIMMING POOL; SPA.—The term "swimming pool" or "spa" means any outdoor or indoor structure intended for swimming or recreational bathing, including in-ground and above-ground structures, and includes hot tubs, spas, portable spas, and non-portable wading pools.

SEC. 8. CPSC REPORT.

- Within 1 year after the close of each fiscal year for
- 3 which grants are made under section 4, the Commission
- 4 shall submit a report to the Congress evaluating the effec-
- 5 tiveness of the grant program authorized by that section.
