A BILL

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To amend title 38, United States Code, to provide for certain requirements for the placement of monuments in Arlington National Cemetery, and for other purposes.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Honoring American Vet-
5	erans Act of 2011".
6	SEC. 2. REQUIREMENTS FOR THE PLACEMENT OF MONU-
7	MENTS IN ARLINGTON NATIONAL CEMETERY.
8	Section 2409(b) of title 38, United States Code, is
9	amended—
10	(1) by striking "Under" and inserting "(1)
11	Under";
12	(2) by inserting after "Secretary of the Army"
13	the following: "and subject to paragraph (2)"; and
14	(3) by adding at the end the following new para-
15	graphs:
16	"(2)(A) Except for a monument containing or mark-
17	ing interred remains, no monument (or similar structure,
18	as determined by the Secretary of the Army in regulations)
19	may be placed in Arlington National Cemetery except pur-
20	suant to the provisions of this subsection.
21	"(B) A monument may be placed in Arlington Na-
22	tional Cemetery if the monument commemorates—
23	"(i) the service in the Armed Forces of the indi-
24	
24	vidual, or group of individuals, whose memory is to

1	"(ii) a particular military event.
2	"(C) No monument may be placed in Arlington Na-
3	tional Cemetery until the end of the 25-year period begin-
4	ning—
5	((i) in the case of the commemoration of service
6	under subparagraph $(B)(i)$, on the last day of the pe-
7	riod of service so commemorated; and
8	"(ii) in the case of the commemoration of a par-
9	ticular military event under subparagraph $(B)(ii)$, on
10	the last day of the period of the event.
11	"(D) A monument may be placed only in those sections
12	of Arlington National Cemetery designated by the Secretary
13	of the Army for such placement and only on land the Sec-
14	retary determines is not suitable for burial.
15	(E) A monument may only be placed in Arlington
16	National Cemetery if an appropriate non-governmental en-
17	tity has agreed to act as a sponsoring organization to co-
18	ordinate the placement of the monument and—
19	"(i) the construction and placement of the monu-
20	ment are paid for only using funds from private
21	sources;
22	"(ii) the Secretary of the Army consults with the
23	Commission of Fine Arts before approving the design
24	of the monument; and

1	"(iii) the sponsoring organization provides for
2	an independent study on the availability and suit-
3	ability of alternative locations for the proposed monu-
4	ment outside of Arlington National Cemetery.
5	"(3)(A) The Secretary of the Army may waive the re-
6	quirement under paragraph $(2)(C)$ in a case in which the
7	monument would commemorate a group of individuals who
8	the Secretary determines—
9	"(i) has made valuable contributions to the
10	Armed Forces that have been ongoing and perpetual
11	for longer than 25 years and are expected to continue
12	on indefinitely; and
13	"(ii) has provided service that is of such a char-
14	acter that the failure to place a monument to the
15	group in Arlington National Cemetery would present
16	a manifest injustice.
17	"(B) If the Secretary waives such requirement under
18	subparagraph (A), the Secretary shall—
19	"(i) make available on an Internet website noti-
20	fication of the waiver and the rationale for the waiv-
21	er; and
22	"(ii) submit to the Committee on Veterans' Af-
23	fairs and the Committee on Armed Services of the
24	Senate and the Committee on Veterans' Affairs and
25	the Committee on Armed Services of the House of

Representatives written notice of the waiver and the
 rationale for the waiver.

3 "(4) The Secretary of the Army shall provide notice to the Committee on Armed Services and the Committee on 4 5 Veterans' Affairs of the Senate and the Committee on Veterans' Affairs and the Committee on Armed Services of the 6 7 House of Representatives of any monument proposed to be 8 placed in Arlington National Cemetery. During the 60-day 9 period beginning on the date on which such notice is received, Congress may pass a joint resolution of disapproval 10 11 of the placement of the monument. The proposed monument may not be placed in Arlington National Cemetery until 12 13 the later of—

"(A) if Congress does not pass a joint resolution
of disapproval of the placement of the monument, the
date that is 60 days after the date on which notice
is received under this paragraph; or

"(B) if Congress passes a joint resolution of disapproval of the placement of the monument, and the
President signs a veto of such resolution, the earlier
of—

22 "(i) the date on which either House of Con23 gress votes and fails to override the veto of the
24 President: or

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4 SEC. 3. CODIFICATION OF PROHIBITION AGAINST RESERVA5 TION OF GRAVESITES AT ARLINGTON NA6 TIONAL CEMETERY.

7 (a) IN GENERAL.—Chapter 24 of title 38, United
8 States Code, is amended by inserting after section 2410 the
9 following new section:

10 "\$2410A. Arlington National Cemetery: other admin11 istrative matters

12 "(a) ONE GRAVESITE PER FAMILY.—(1) Not more 13 than one gravesite may be provided at Arlington National 14 Cemetery to a veteran or member of the Armed Forces who 15 is eligible for interment at such cemetery and the family 16 members of such veteran or member who are also eligible 17 for interment at such cemetery.

18 "(2) The Secretary may waive the requirement under paragraph (1) in extreme circumstances, as determined by 19 the Secretary. If the Secretary waives such requirement 20 21 under this paragraph, the Secretary shall submit notice of 22 the waiver to the Committee on Veterans' Affairs and the 23 Committee on Armed Services of the Senate and the Com-24 mittee on Veterans' Affairs and the Committee on Armed Services of the House of Representatives. 25

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"(b) PROHIBITION AGAINST RESERVATION OF
 GRAVESITES.—A gravesite at Arlington National Cemetery
 may not be reserved for an individual before the death of
 such individual.".

5 (b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of sections at
6 the beginning of chapter 24 of such title is amended by in7 serting after the item relating to section 2410 the following
8 new item:

"2410A. Arlington National Cemetery: other administrative matters.".

9 (c) APPLICABILITY.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in paragraph (2), section 2410A of such title, as added by
subsection (a), shall apply with respect to all interments at Arlington National Cemetery after the date
of the enactment of this Act.

15 (2) EXCEPTION.—Subsection (b) of such section,
16 as so added, shall not apply with respect to the inter17 ment of an individual for whom a written request for
18 a reserved gravesite was submitted to the Secretary of
19 the Army before January 1, 1962, and subsequently
20 approved.

21 (d) REPORT.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after
the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of
the Army shall submit to Congress a report on res-

ervations made for interment at Arlington National
Cemetery.
(2) ELEMENTS.—The report required by para-
graph (1) shall include the following:
(A) The number of requests for reservation
of a gravesite at Arlington National Cemetery
that were submitted to the Secretary of the Army
before January 1, 1962.
(B) The number of gravesites at such ceme-
tery that, on the day before the date of the enact-
ment of this Act, were reserved in response to
such requests.
(C) The number of such gravesites that, on
the day before the date of the enactment of this
Act, were unoccupied.

(D) A list of all reservations for gravesites 16 17 at such cemetery that were extended by individ-18 uals responsible for management of such ceme-19 tery in response to requests for such reservations 20 made on or after January 1, 1962.

21 (E) A description of the measures that the 22 Secretary is taking to improve the accountability 23 and transparency of the management of gravesite reservations at Arlington National Cemetery. 24

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1	(F) Such recommendations as the Secretary
2	may have for legislative action as the Secretary
3	considers necessary to improve such account-
4	ability and transparency.
5	SEC. 4. SENSE OF CONGRESS REGARDING THE PROVISION
6	OF A MEMORIAL MARKER ON CHAPLAINS
7	HILL TO HONOR THE MEMORY OF THE JEW-
8	ISH CHAPLAINS WHO DIED WHILE ON ACTIVE
9	DUTY IN THE ARMED FORCES OF THE UNITED
10	STATES.
11	(a) FINDINGS.—Congress makes the following findings:
12	(1) 13 Jewish chaplains have died while on ac-
13	tive duty in the Armed Forces of the United States.
14	(2) Army Chaplain Rabbi Alexander Goode died
15	on February 3, 1943, when then U.S.S. Dorchester
16	was sunk by German torpedoes off the coast of Green-
17	land.
18	(3) Chaplain Goode received the Four Chaplains'
19	Medal for Heroism and the Distinguished Service
20	Cross for his heroic efforts to save the lives of those
21	onboard the Dorchester.
22	(4) Army Chaplain Rabbi Irving Tepper was
23	killed in action in France on August 13, 1944.

1	(5) Chaplain Tepper also saw combat in Mo-
2	rocco, Tunisia, and Sicily while attached to an infan-
3	try combat team in the Ninth Division.
4	(6) Army Chaplain Rabbi Louis Werfel died on
5	December 24, 1944, at the young age of 27, in a plane
6	crash while en route to conduct Chanukah services.
7	(7) Chaplain Werfel was known as "The Flying
8	Rabbi" because his duties required traveling great
9	distances by plane to serve Army personnel of Jewish
10	faith at outlying posts.
11	(8) Army Chaplain Rabbi Meir Engel died at
12	the Naval Hospital in Saigon, Vietnam, on December
13	16, 1964, after faithfully serving his country during
14	World War II, the Korean War, and the Vietnam
15	War.
16	(9) Army Chaplain Rabbi Morton Singer died
17	on December 17, 1968, in a plane crash while on a
18	mission in Vietnam to conduct Chanukah services.
19	(10) Army Chaplain Rabbi Herman Rosen died
20	in service of his faith and his country on June 18,
21	1943.
22	(11) His son, Air Force Chaplain Solomon
23	Rosen, also died in service of his faith and his coun-
24	try on November 2, 1948.

1	(12) Army Chaplain Rabbi Nachman Arnoff
2	died in service of his faith and his country on May
3	9, 1946.
4	(13) Army Chaplain Rabbi Frank Goldenberg
5	died in service of his faith and his country on May
6	22, 1946.
7	(14) Army Chaplain Rabbi Henry Goody died
8	in service of his faith and his country on October 19,
9	1943.
10	(15) Army Chaplain Rabbi Samuel Hurwitz
11	died in service of his faith and his country on Decem-
12	ber 9, 1943.
13	(16) Air Force Chaplain Rabbi Samuel Rosen
14	died in service of his faith and his country on May
15	13, 1955.
16	(17) Air Force Chaplain Rabbi David Sobel died
17	in service of his faith and his country on March 7,
18	1974.
19	(18) Chaplains Hill in Arlington National Cem-
20	etery memorializes the names of 242 chaplains who
21	perished while serving on active duty in the Armed
22	Forces of the United States.
23	(19) None of the 13 Jewish chaplains who have
24	died while serving on active duty are memorialized
25	on Chaplains Hill.

1 (b) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of Congress 2 that an appropriate site on Chaplains Hill in Arlington National Cemetery should be provided for a memorial 3 4 marker, to be paid for with private funds, to honor the 5 memory of the Jewish chaplains who died while on active 6 duty in the Armed Forces of the United States, so long as 7 the Secretary of the Army has exclusive authority to ap-8 prove the design and site of the memorial marker.

9 SEC. 5. SENSE OF CONGRESS REGARDING THE SERVICE
10 AND SACRIFICE OF MEMBERS OF THE UNITED
11 STATES ARMED FORCES WHO ARE SERVING
12 IN, OR HAVE SERVED IN, OPERATION ENDUR13 ING FREEDOM, OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM,
14 AND OPERATION NEW DAWN.

(a) FINDINGS.—Congress makes the following findings:
(1) More than 2,000,000 members of the Armed
Forces have deployed to the theaters of war since the
commencement of Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Iraqi Freedom, and Operation New Dawn.

20 (2) Hundreds of thousands of such members have
21 deployed for multiple tours of duty, leaving their
22 homes, their families, and in many cases, their civil23 ian jobs.

1	(3) More than 5,500 members of the Armed
2	Forces have made the ultimate sacrifice for the United
3	States while serving in Iraq or Afghanistan.
4	(4) Tens of thousands of additional members of
5	the Armed Forces have been seriously wounded in the
6	line of duty while serving in these theaters of war.
7	(5) These members of the Armed Forces have an-
8	swered the Nation's call to duty, serving bravely and
9	nobly and, in most cases, without fanfare or acclaim.
10	(6) These members of the Armed Forces have per-
11	sonified the virtues of patriotism, service, duty, cour-
12	age, and sacrifice.
13	(7) All Americans recognize the service and sac-
14	rifices made by these members of the Armed Forces
15	and their families.
16	(b) Sense of Congress.—Congress—
17	(1) honors the members of the Armed Forces who
18	are serving in Operation Enduring Freedom, Oper-
19	ation Iraqi Freedom, and Operation New Dawn and
20	the members and veterans who have previously served
21	in Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Iraqi
22	Freedom, and Operation New Dawn; and
23	(2) calls on all Americans to reflect on the serv-
24	ice of these members and veterans and to hold them
25	in a special place of honor now and in the future.

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
