9 does not exceed the difference obtained by sub-
10 tracting—

 17 mittee on Appropriations, committee allocations con-
 18 sistent with title I for fiscal year 2017 and for the
 19 period of fiscal years 2017 through 2026 for the
 20 purpose of enforcing 302 of the Congressional Budg-
 21 et Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 633).

22 **SEC. 4002. BUDGETARY TREATMENT OF ADMINISTRATIVE**
 23 **EXPENSES.**

24 (a) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding section
 25 302(a)(1) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2

1 U.S.C. 633(a)(1)), section 13301 of the Budget Enforce-
2 ment Act of 1990 (2 U.S.C. 632 note), and section 2009a
3 of title 39, United States Code, the report accompanying
4 this concurrent resolution on the budget, the joint explan-
5 atory statement accompanying the conference report on
6 any concurrent resolution on the budget, or a statement
7 filed under section 4001 shall include in an allocation
8 under section 302(a) of the Congressional Budget Act of
9 1974 to the Committee on Appropriations of the applica-
10 ble House of Congress amounts for the discretionary ad-
11 ministrative expenses of the Social Security Administra-
12 tion and the United States Postal Service.

13 (b) SPECIAL RULE.—In the Senate and the House
14 of Representatives, for purposes of enforcing section
15 302(f) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C.
16 633(f)), estimates of the level of total new budget author-
17 ity and total outlays provided by a measure shall include
18 any discretionary amounts described in subsection (a).

19 **SEC. 4003. APPLICATION AND EFFECT OF CHANGES IN AL-**
20 **LOCATIONS AND AGGREGATES.**

21 (a) APPLICATION.—Any adjustments of allocations
22 and aggregates made pursuant to this concurrent resolu-
23 tion shall—

24 (1) apply while that measure is under consider-
25 ation;

1 (2) take effect upon the enactment of that
2 measure; and

3 (3) be published in the Congressional Record as
4 soon as practicable.

5 (b) EFFECT OF CHANGED ALLOCATIONS AND AG-
6 GREGATES.—Revised allocations and aggregates resulting
7 from these adjustments shall be considered for the pur-
8 poses of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C.
9 621 et seq.) as the allocations and aggregates contained
10 in this concurrent resolution.

11 (c) BUDGET COMMITTEE DETERMINATIONS.—For
12 purposes of this concurrent resolution, the levels of new
13 budget authority, outlays, direct spending, new entitle-
14 ment authority, revenues, deficits, and surpluses for a fis-
15 cal year or period of fiscal years shall be determined on
16 the basis of estimates made by the Chairman of the Com-
17 mittee on the Budget of the applicable House of Congress.

18 (d) AGGREGATES, ALLOCATIONS AND APPLICA-
19 TION.—In the House of Representatives, for purposes of
20 this concurrent resolution and budget enforcement, the
21 consideration of any bill or joint resolution, or amendment
22 thereto or conference report thereon, for which the Chair-
23 man of the Committee on the Budget of the House of Rep-
24 resentatives makes adjustments or revisions in the alloca-
25 tions, aggregates, and other budgetary levels of this con-

1 current resolution shall not be subject to the points of
2 order set forth in clause 10 of rule XXI of the Rules of
3 the House of Representatives or section 3101 of S. Con.
4 Res. 11 (114th Congress).

5 **SEC. 4004. EXERCISE OF RULEMAKING POWERS.**

6 Congress adopts the provisions of this title—

7 (1) as an exercise of the rulemaking power of
8 the Senate and the House of Representatives, re-
9 spectively, and as such they shall be considered as
10 part of the rules of each House or of that House to
11 which they specifically apply, and such rules shall
12 supersede other rules only to the extent that they
13 are inconsistent with such other rules; and

14 (2) with full recognition of the constitutional
15 right of either the Senate or the House of Rep-
16 resentatives to change those rules (insofar as they
17 relate to that House) at any time, in the same man-
18 ner, and to the same extent as is the case of any
19 other rule of the Senate or House of Representa-
20 tives.
