Post Office located at 2266 Fifth Avenue, New York, NY 10037, where he worked after returning from his military service for over three decades.

Just last month he said "I regret so many of my comrades are no longer here with us. It was a great experience. We didn't know that we were making history at the time, we were just doing our jobs. That's about the size of it."

For a man with a larger than life presence, what struck me and those around him was his humility and grace. He told us "After looking back at it, everyone was pleased with what we did. What we did, we did our best and our best was the greatest." We are lesser without him and can only hope to strive to match; but never exceed his example.
