AN ACT

To prioritize the efforts of and enhance coordination among United States agencies to encourage countries in Europe and Eurasia to diversify their energy sources and supply routes, increase energy security in the region, and help the United States reach its global energy security goals, and for other purposes.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "European Energy Se-
5	curity and Diversification Act of 2019".
6	SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
7	In this Act:
8	(1) EARLY-STAGE PROJECT SUPPORT.—The
9	term "early-stage project support" includes the fol-
10	lowing:
11	(A) Feasibility studies.
12	(B) Resource evaluations.
13	(C) Project appraisal and costing.
14	(D) Pilot projects.
15	(E) Commercial support, such as trade
16	missions, reverse trade missions, technical
17	workshops, international buyer programs, and
18	international partner searchers to link suppliers
19	to projects.
20	(F) Technical assistance and other guid-
21	ance to improve the local regulatory environ-
22	ment and market frameworks to encourage
23	transparent competition and enhance energy se-
24	curity.
25	(G) Long-term energy sector planning.

(2) LATE-STAGE PROJECT SUPPORT.—The term
 "late-stage project support" includes support de scribed in section 1421 of the Better Utilization of
 Investments Leading to Development Act of 2018
 (also referred to as the "BUILD Act of 2018"; en acted as division F of the FAA Reauthorization Act
 of 2018 (Public Law 115–254)).

8 (3) INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL INSTITU9 TION.—The term "international financial institu10 tion" has the meaning given such term in section
11 1701(c) of the International Financial Institutions
12 Act (22 U.S.C. 262r(c)).

13 SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS; STATEMENT OF POLICY.

(a) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of Congress that the United States has economic and national
security interests in assisting European and Eurasian
countries achieve energy security through diversification
of their energy sources and supply routes.

19 (b) STATEMENT OF POLICY.—It is the policy of the20 United States to—

(1) advance United States foreign policy and
development goals by assisting European and Eurasian countries to reduce their dependence on energy
resources from countries that use energy dependence
for undue political influence, such as the Russian

1	Federation, which has used natural gas to coerce, in-
2	timidate, and influence other countries;
3	(2) promote the energy security of European
4	and Eurasian allies and partners of the United
5	States by encouraging the development of accessible,
6	transparent, and competitive energy markets that
7	provide diversified sources, types, and routes of en-
8	ergy;
9	(3) encourage United States public and private
10	sector investment in European and Eurasian energy
11	infrastructure projects to bridge the gap between en-
12	ergy security requirements and commercial demand
13	in a way that is consistent with the region's absorp-
14	tive capacity;
15	(4) help facilitate a well-functioning market for
16	energy resources in a way that benefits the energy
17	security of the United States and European and
18	Eurasian allies and partners of the United States;
19	and
20	(5) help facilitate the export of United States
21	energy technology and expertise to global markets.

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1SEC. 4. PRIORITIZATION OF EFFORTS AND ASSISTANCE2FOR ENERGY INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS3IN EUROPE AND EURASIA.

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—In pursuing the policy described 5 in section 3(b), the Secretary of State, in coordination with the heads of United States agencies that operate 6 7 under the foreign policy guidance of the Secretary, shall, 8 as appropriate, prioritize and expedite the efforts of the 9 Department of State and such agencies in supporting the efforts of the European Commission and European and 10 11 Eurasian countries to increase the energy security of such countries, including through-12

(1) providing diplomatic and political support to
the European Commission and such countries, as
necessary to—

16 (A) facilitate international negotiations
17 concerning cross-border infrastructure;

(B) enhance Europe's and Eurasia's regulatory environment with respect to energy; and
(C) develop accessible, transparent, and
competitive energy markets supplied by diverse

22 sources, types, and routes of energy; and

(2) providing support to improve European and
Eurasian energy markets, including early-stage
project support and late-stage project support for

the construction or improvement of energy infra-
structure, as necessary, to—
(A) diversify the energy sources and supply
routes of such countries;
(B) enhance energy market integration
across the region; and
(C) increase competition within energy
markets.
(b) Project Selection.—
(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of State, in
consultation with the heads of agencies described in
subsection (a), shall identify and, in accordance with
paragraph (3), select energy infrastructure projects
that would be appropriate for United States assist-
ance under this section.
(2) PROJECT ELIGIBILITY.—A project is eligible
for United States assistance under this section if
such project is—
(A) related to—
(i) natural gas infrastructure, such as
interconnectors, storage facilities, liquefied
natural gas import facilities, or reverse
flow capacity;

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1	(ii) electricity transmission infrastruc-
2	ture, electricity storage projects, or smart
3	grid projects;
4	(iii) renewable energy projects in
5	wind, solar, tidal, or other forms; or
6	(iv) the improvement, rehabilitation,
7	or construction of electricity generation fa-
8	cilities to increase the efficiency and reli-
9	ability of electricity production; and
10	(B) located in a European or Eurasian
11	country.
12	(3) Preference.—In selecting among projects
13	that are eligible under paragraph (2), the Secretary
14	of State and the heads of agencies described in sub-
15	section (a) shall give preference to projects that—
16	(A) improve the capacity of energy systems
17	to efficiently transfer gas and electricity within
18	and between European or Eurasian countries;
19	(B) have already been identified by the
20	European Commission as being integral for the
21	energy security of European or Eurasian coun-
22	tries;
23	(C) are expected to enhance energy market
24	integration and transparency;

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1 (D) can attract funding from the private 2 sector, an international financial institution, the 3 government of the country in which the project 4 will be carried out, or the European Commis-5 sion; or 6 (E) have the potential to use United States 7 goods and services. 8 (c) Types of Assistance.— 9 (1) DIPLOMATIC AND POLITICAL SUPPORT.— 10 The Secretary of State, in coordination with the 11 heads of agencies described in subsection (a), as ap-12 propriate, shall provide diplomatic and political sup-13 port to the European Commission and European or 14 Eurasian countries, as necessary, including by using 15 the diplomatic and political influence and expertise 16 of the Department of State to build the capacity of 17 such countries to resolve any impediments to the de-18 velopment of projects selected under subsection (b). 19 (2)EARLY-STAGE PROJECT SUPPORT.—The 20 Secretary of State, in coordination, as appropriate, 21 with the heads of agencies described in subsection 22 (a), including the Director of the Trade and Devel-23 opment Agency, shall provide early-stage project 24 support to projects selected under subsection (b), as

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1	necessary and in accordance with section 661 of the
2	Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2421).
3	(3) LATE-STAGE PROJECT SUPPORT.—The Sec-
4	retary of State, in coordination, as appropriate, with
5	the heads of agencies described in subsection (a),
6	shall provide late-stage project support to projects
7	selected under subsection (b), as necessary and in
8	accordance with section 1412 of the Better Utiliza-
9	tion of Investments Leading to Development Act (re-
10	lating to the establishment of the United States
11	International Development Finance Corporation).
12	(d) FUNDING.—
13	(1) TRADE AND DEVELOPMENT AGENCY.—Sub-
14	paragraph (A) of section $661(f)(1)$ of the Foreign
15	Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. $2421(f)(1)$) is
16	amended by striking "\$48,000,000 for fiscal year
17	2000" and inserting "\$79,500,000 for fiscal year
18	2020".
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19	(2) Countering Russian influence fund.—
19 20	(2) Countering Russian Influence Fund.— Section 254 of the Countering Russian Influence in
20	Section 254 of the Countering Russian Influence in
20 21	Section 254 of the Countering Russian Influence in Europe and Eurasia Act of 2017 (enacted as title II

1	(A) in subsection (a), by striking "fiscal
2	years 2018 and 2019" and adding "fiscal years
3	2020 and 2021"; and
4	(B) in subsection (b), by adding at the end
5	the following new paragraph:
6	"(7) To assist United States agencies that op-
7	erate under the foreign policy guidance of the Sec-
8	retary of State in providing assistance under section
9	4 of the European Energy Security and Diversifica-
10	tion Act of 2019.".
11	(e) EXCEPTION.—No United States assistance under
12	this section may be provided to a European or Eurasian
13	country that engages in a significant transaction described
14	in subsection (a) of section 231 of the Countering Amer-
15	ica's Adversaries Through Sanctions Act (22 U.S.C.
16	9525).
17	SEC. 5. PROGRESS REPORTS.
18	Not later than one year after the date of the enact-

19 ment of this Act and annually thereafter for seven years,
20 the President shall transmit to the Committee on Foreign
21 Relations of the Senate and the Committee on Foreign
22 Affairs of the House of Representatives a report on
23 progress made in providing assistance for projects under
24 section 4 that includes the following:

1	(1) A description of the energy infrastructure
2	projects the United States has identified for such as-
3	sistance.
4	(2) For each such project, the following:
5	(A) A description of the role of the United
6	States in the project, including in early-stage
7	project support and late-stage project support.
8	(B) The amount and form of any debt fi-
9	nancing and insurance provided by the United
10	States Government for the project.
11	(C) The amount and form of any early-
12	stage project support.
13	(D) An update on the progress made on
14	the project as of the date of the report.
