Partial-Birth Abortion Ban—Veto Message: By 64 yeas to 36 nays (Vote No. 277), two-thirds of the Senators voting not having voted in the affirmative, H.R. 1122, to amend title 18, United States Code, to ban partial-birth abortions, upon reconsideration, was rejected, and the veto of the President was sustained. **Pages S10551–64**

Child Custody Protection Act: Senate began consideration of S. 1645, to amend title 18, United States Code, to prohibit taking minors across State lines to avoid laws requiring the involvement of parents in abortion decisions, with a committee amendment in the nature of a substitute. **Pages S10564–67**

The Martinez amendment in the nature of a substitute, numbered 2 and printed in House Report 105–726, that establishes the "Class-Size Reduction and Teacher Quality Act" and authorizes \$20.8 bil-

lion, allocated by the Department of Education to the States, over the next 10 years to reduce class size in grades 1 through 3 to an average of 18 students per class and allow school districts to hire an additional 100,000 teachers (rejected by a recorded vote of 190 ayes to 215 noes, Roll No. 451);
