

Assistance to National Historic Trails Center in Wyoming: The House agreed to the Senate amendments to H.R. 2186, to authorize the Secretary of the Interior to provide assistance to the National Historic Trails Interpretive Center in Casper, Wyoming—clearing the measure for the President.

Rogue River National Park Boundary Adjustment: The House agreed to the Senate amendment to H.R. 3796, to authorize the Secretary of Agriculture to convey the administrative site for the Rogue River National Forest and use the proceeds for the construction or improvement of offices and support buildings for the Rogue River National Forest and the Bureau of Land Management—clearing the measure for the President.

Granite Watershed Enhancement and Protection: The House agreed to the Senate amendments to H.R. 2886, to provide for a demonstration project in the Stanislaus National Forest, California, under which a private contractor will perform multiple resource management activities for that unit of the National Forest System.

National Park Fees: The House passed S. 1333, to amend the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965 to allow national park units that cannot charge an entrance or admission fee to retain other fees and charges—clearing the measure for the President.

National Historic Site Boundary Modification: The House passed S. 2246, to amend the Act which established the Frederick Law Olmsted National Historic Site, in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, by modifying the boundary—clearing the measure for the President.

Adams National Historical Park: The House passed S. 2240, to establish the Adams National Historical Park in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts—clearing the measure for the President.

Women's Progress Commemoration: The House passed S. 2285, to establish a commission, in honor of the 150th Anniversary of the Seneca Falls Conven-

tion, to further protect sites of importance in the historic efforts to secure equal rights for women—clearing the measure for the President.

Legislative Authority for Black Patriots Foundation: The House passed S. 2427, to amend the Omnibus Parks and Public Lands Management Act of 1996 to extend the legislative authority for the Black Patriots Foundation to establish a commemorative work—clearing the measure for the President.

Technical Corrections to Omnibus Parks and Public Lands Management: The House passed H.R. 4735, to make technical corrections to the Omnibus Parks and Public Lands Management Act of 1996.

Dante Fascell Biscayne National Park Visitor Center Designation: The House passed S. 2468, to designate the Biscayne National Park Visitor Center as the Dante Fascell Visitor Center—clearing the measure for the President.

Congressional Record

The public proceedings of each House of Congress, as reported by the Official Reporters thereof, are printed pursuant to directions of the Joint Committee on Printing as authorized by appropriate provisions of Title 44, United States Code, and published for each day that one or both Houses are in session, excepting very infrequent instances when two or more unusually small consecutive issues are printed at one time. ¶Public access to the Congressional Record is available online through *GPO Access*, a service of the Government Printing Office, free of charge to the user. The online database is updated each day the Congressional Record is published. The database includes both text and graphics from the beginning of the 103d Congress, 2d session (January 1994) forward. It is available on the Wide Area Information Server (WAIS) through the Internet and via asynchronous dial-in. Internet users can access the database by using the World Wide Web; the Superintendent of Documents home page address is http://www.access.gpo.gov/su_docs, by using local WAIS client software or by telnet to swais.access.gpo.gov, then login as guest (no password required). Dial-in users should use communications software and modem to call (202) 512-1661; type swais, then login as guest (no password required). The semimonthly Congressional Record Index may be purchased for the same per issue prices. Remit check or money order, made payable to the Superintendent of Documents, directly to the Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. ¶Following each session of Congress, the daily Congressional Record is revised, printed, permanently bound and sold by the Superintendent of Documents in individual parts or by sets. ¶With the exception of copyrighted articles, there are no restrictions on the republication of material from the Congressional Record.
