Section 803(b)(1) of this legislation excepts the disclosure of information that would "constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy." This matter falls within the Committee on the Judiciary's subject matter jurisdiction under rule X(1)(1)(5)("Civil liberties"). Section 803(b)(3) also excepts the disclosure of information that would "reveal information that would assist in the development or use of weapons of mass destruction." This matter falls within the Committee on the Judiciary's subject matter jurisdiction under rule X(1)(1)(10)("Subversive activities affecting the internal security of the United States"). Finally, Section 803(d) pertains to the disclosure of records "related to or supporting any active or inactive investigation, inquiry, or prosecution of the Office of Special Investigations of the Department of Justice." This matter falls with the Committee on the Judiciary's subject matter jurisdiction under rule X(1)(1) ("The judiciary and judicial proceedings, civil and criminal").

The Committee on the Judiciary takes this action with the understanding that the Committee's jurisdiction over these provisions is in no way altered or diminished. I would appreciate the inclusion of this letter and your response to it in the Congressional Record during consideration of S. 384 on the House floor. Thank you for your consideration in this matter.

Finally, I would ask that you include a copy of our exchange of letters on this mat-

ter in the Congressional Record during the House debate on S. 384. Thank you for your consideration.
